This brief provides an overview of the core components and practice considerations of the rapid re-housing model generally, and not under a specific funding type. Rapid re-housing is an intervention, informed by a Housing First approach that is a critical part of a community's effective homeless crisis response system. Rapid re-housing rapidly connects families and individuals experiencing homelessness to permanent housing through a tailored package of assistance that may include the use of time-limited financial assistance and targeted supportive services.

Rapid re-housing (RRH) for youth (defined as less than 25 years of age) is an evolving model that can be implemented using the PH-RRH component type under HUD's Continuum of Care (CoC) Program. Successful programs that HUD has profiled use a variety of funding sources (e.g., HUD, HHS, private and foundation funding, etc.); however, each has developed replicable, CoC-eligible, promising practices for:

1. Rapidly moving youth into permanent housing;
2. Offering short- to medium-term financial assistance; and
3. Providing developmentally appropriate case management and services.
